Shigeru Ban: An Architect for Emergencies

A FILM BY MICHEL QUINEJURE

The Japanese architect Shigeru
Ban is noted for his use of inexpensive construction materials such as paperboard and cardboard tubes, which, in
addition to providing emergency DIY prefab
housing for earthquake victims, he has used
to create homes, pavilions and churches.

In the documentary SHIGERU BAN this innovative architect discusses the practical, philosophical and aesthetic aspects of his work. In addition to his conservationist interest in using recycled materials, Ban discusses his influences, his concerns with the bidimensional and tridimensional nature of his buildings, his aim to incorporate structural elements into the overall designs, as well as their sensitivity to light and shade, which lends unusual vitality to his buildings.

SHIGERU BAN is also a visual exploration of many of Ban's major buildings, including the massive Japanese Pavilion for the 2000 Exposition in Hanover, Germany; the Paper Dome in Gero, Japan; the House with Double Roof in Yamanaka Lake, Japan; the Miyake Design Studio Gallery, the Hanegi Forest Home and the Ivy Structure 2 in Tokyo; the Paper Church in Kobe; and the 9 Square Grids House in Hadano.

While showcasing his designs, SHIGERU BAN reveals that an emphasis on issues of conservation, economy, and accessibility does not necessarily involve a sacrifice in architectural beauty.



The Future of Mud: The Tale of a Mason's Family

A FILM BY SUSAN VOGEL / PRESENTED BY THE MUSÉE NATIONAL DU MALI



Through the story of a mason in Djenne, Komusa Tenapo, and his family, this documentary examines an African tradition of mud architecture in Mali. The environmental genius of these ancient construction techniques—thick walls with tiny windows that keep the interiors cool despite the stifling heat—is expressed in strikingly beautiful designs that have won the town of Djenne designation as a World Heritage site.

THE FUTURE OF MUD reveals Komusa's hand building methods, utilizing sun-dried bricks made of mud from the flood plain which contains decayed fish and cattle manure that are mixed with organic materials such as straw and rice chaff. The film shows him at work on two building sites, and at the annual repair of the Great Mosque, employing thousand-year-old construction techniques, plus the secret knowledge he inherited from his family of masons, including religious rituals to protect homes and workers from evil spirits.

Komousa, family members and Madame Diallo, a Cultural Heritage official, present information on the history of Malian architecture. The film also shows the annual replastering of Dejenne's Great Mosque, the largest mud brick building in the world, a day-long, boisterous community effort, and a major public celebration observed by local residents and a few tourists.

Eileen Gray: Designer and Architect

A FILM BY JÖRG BUNDSCHUH

Eileen Gray (1878-1976) was always ahead of her time. And thirty years after her death, she is still considered the very essence of the Modern.

Everyone has seen her furniture—including the famous Adjustable Table, the Lota Sofa, and the Tube Light—but most people don't really know the designer and architect who created them.

Gray studied at the Slade School of Fine Arts in London before moving to Paris in 1902







EILEEN GRAY: Designer and Architect also examines the history of her architectural creations, including E.1027, built in Roquebrune, France, in 1926. This modernist seaside villa—an L-shaped, flat-roofed building with floor-to-ceiling windows and a spiral staircase—has been declared a French national monument and is now being restored. After Gray left the home in the early 1930s, it was occupied by Le Corbusier, who decorated its walls with colorful murals, which Gray considered a desecration, and the argument destroyed their friendship.

Using archival footage, excerpts from Gray's writings, plus interviews with a museum curator, an art appraiser and a design manufacturer, EILEEN GRAY chronicles this designer's artistic formation, her travels and influences, and her relations with fellow artists and architects such as Jean Badovici, Seizo Sugawara, and Le Corbusier,

Lagos/Koolhaas

A FILM BY BREGTJE VAN DER HAAK

Rem Koolhaas—winner of the Pritzker Architecture Prize—is a Professor of Architecture and Urban Design at Harvard. For the past eleven years Koolhaas and students from The Harvard Project on the City have come to Lagos, Nigeria regularly to research the type of urban environment produced by explosive population growth.

The Project on the City is framed by two concepts: academia's bewilderment with new forms of accelerated urbanization in developing regions and the maelstrom of redevelopment in existing urban areas; and the failure of the design professions to adequately cope with these changes.

LAGOS / KOOLHAAS follows Koolhaas over a period of two years as he wanders through the city, talking with people and recognizing the problems with water, electricity and traffic. Instead of judging the city to be doomed, he is able to interpret this "culture of congestion" positively, helping to develop a new concept of the big city.

Kochuu: Japanese Architecture / Influence & Origin

A FILM BY JESPER WACHTMEISTER

KOCHUU is a visually stunning film about modern Japanese architecture, its roots in Japanese culture, and its interplay with the Nordic building tradition. Winding its way through visions of the future and traditional concepts, nature and concrete, gardens and high-tech spaces, the film investigates how many contemporary Japanese architects strive to unite the ways of modern man with the old philosophies in astounding constructions.

KOCHUU, which translates as "in the jar," refers to the Japanese tradition of constructing small, enclosed physical spaces. The film illustrates key components of traditional Japanese architecture, such as reducing the distinction between outdoors and indoors, disrupting the symmetrical, building with posts rather than with walls, modular construction techniques, and its symbiotic relationship with water, light and nature.

The film illustrates these concepts through views of, among dozens of other buildings and gardens, the Imperial Katsura Palace, the Todai-Ji Temple, the Naoshima Contemporary Art Museum, the Sony Tower, numerous teahouses and gardens as well as examples of the cross-fertilization evidenced in buildings throughout Scandinavia, and shows how "invisible" Japanese traditions are evident even in modern, high-tech buildings.

KOCHUU introduces Japan's leading architects as well as Scandinavian contemporaries—including Pritzker Prize winners Tadao Ando and Sverre Fehn—to explore how the aesthetics of Japanese architecture and design are expressed through simple means, and also shows that the best architecture expresses spiritual qualities that enrich human life.



Great Expectations: A Journey Through the History of Visionary Architecture

A FILM BY JESPER WACHTMEISTER

The new film from the director of KOCHUU (see Page 7), this is an astonishing journey through the history of innovative, futuristic, utopian and sometimes bizarre architecture projects—from the beginning of the 20th century to today.

Since the end of the 19th century, due to industrialization and rapid technological progress, mankind has been confronted with new problems and possibilities. Visionary architects and artists, motivated by contemporary problems, including housing shortages, urban decay and pollution, set about to create changes in our ways of living that challenged conventional concepts of the good, the true and the beautiful.



- Levitt and Sons Responding to the need for affordable housing for returning WWII veterans, the Levitts' designs for inexpensive and rapidly constructed tract homes in Long Island, New York gave birth to the American suburban dream.
- > Lucio Costa and Oscar Niemeyer Their sleek but functionalist architecture and innovative urban plan for Brasilia, the capital city of Brazil, built in only four years in the late '50s, remains one of the most modern cities in the world.
- > Buckminster Fuller Aiming to create conditions for a sustainable life on earth by using fewer resources, Fuller designed the lightweight Geodesic Dome, of which today more than 300,000 have been built worldwide.



- Moshe Safdie Safdie's reinvention of the apartment building, introduced at Montreal's Habitat '67 Expo, features a prefab, modular design for middle-class urban housing, where every apartment has a garden.
- > Antti Lovag This French architect's concept of "Habitology," designing architecture for human needs, abandon corners for natural curves and spheres, as seen in his Maisons Bulle and Yellow Round Houses.
- > Paolo Soleri Soleri's concept of "arcology," seen in the ongoing Arcosanti project in Arizona, fuses architecture with ecology in crystal-like, hyperdense desert cities designed for pedestrians.

> Jacque Fresco and Roxanne Meadows — Their Venus Project in Florida, blending functionalism, ecology and science-fiction, aims to create a utopian vision of urban planning for a new society.

With archival and contemporary footage, animation and interviews, GREAT EXPECTA-TIONS traces the story of these grand architectural visions, both realized and unrealized, by great thinkers with revolutionary, if not always successful, ideas.



GREAT EXPECTATIONS introduces us to the most significant visionary architectural movements and personalities of the 20th century, including:

- Rudolf Steiner The Austrian philosopher and educator who designed the mammoth concrete structure of the Goetheanum auditorium and other buildings for the anthroposophy colony in the Swiss countryside.
- > Le Corbusier The Unité d'Habitation apartment building in France, responding to the postwar housing shortage, was designed as a self-contained environment, a building you would never have to leave.



In 1967, at the end of a career spanning more than six decades, which included the design of the Seagram Building in New York, the Lake Shore Drive Apartment Buildings in Chicago, and the Neue Nationalgalerie in Berlin, architect Mies van der Rohe designed a simple gas station near Montreal. The story of that gas station is the point of departure for REGULAR OR SUPER, which examines Mies' body of work (more than 70 buildings).

Mies began his career in Germany early in the 20th century, and during the Thirties taught at the Bauhaus School of Art and Design in Berlin. In 1938, Mies emigrated to Chicago where he designed 22 buildings for the Illinois Institute of Technology. Over the next three decades, in a radical break from the predominant beaux arts style, he refined a distinctive, modernist architectural style emphasizing glass and steel in a variety of buildings whose structures creatively integrated surrounding public space.

REGULAR OR SUPER examines many of Mies' classic buildings, combining their striking





facades with observations from, among others, Rem Koolhaas, Elizabeth Diller and Phyllis Lambert, and anecdotes from customers and neighbors of the gas station, plus comments from his biographer and family members.

Sotsgorod: Cities For Utopia

A PILM BY ANNA ABRAHAMS

After the Revolution the resources on the desolate Russian steppes became crucial in the Communist plan for a new utopia. Huge cities had to be built to house hundreds of thousands of workers, but Soviet architects could not design such cities: the old guard was politically suspect while young designers fantasized about flying cities. So, in the late 1920s and early '30s, well-known Western architects were invited to create the workers' paradises.

SOTSGOROD tells this unknown story in the architects' own words. Some of the last survivors are interviewed: Jan Rutgers (of the Autonomous International Colony Kuzbass), Magarete Schutte-Lihotzky (of the Ernst May group, famous for the super efficient kitchen), and Phillipp Tolziner ("Bauhaus Brigade"). Those who have passed away speak through their letters and lectures, including Hannes Meyer, Hans Schmidt and Ernst May. Some believed they were making an essential contribution to the workers' struggle; others were seizing an unheard of opportunity to apply their design philosophies and spatial theories to entire cities.

SOTSGOROD also visits four of the cities today-Magnitogorsk, Orsk, Novokuznetsk and Kemerov. By looking at the quality of day-today lives there, the film measures the success of the once robust ideals of the architects.



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
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
